1750 Thomas Shepard, his brother in law Thomas Ellison and Samuel Lane, all of Durham visited Holderness Thomas Shepard presented a petition signed by 64 persons To Royal Governor Benning Westworth, for a grant of His Majesty's George the Third's land.

The First Charter: (from Miss Pease's notebook)

Even before the French and Indian War came to a close three men from Durham visited Holderness in 1750. They were Thomas Shepard; his brother-in-law Thomas Ellison and Samuel Lane, a surveyor.

Soon after this visit Thomas Shepard presented a petition signed by sixty-four persons; to Benning Westworth, the Royal Governor, for a grant of land six miles square, on the east side of the Pemigewasset River; as surveyed and planned by Samuel Lane.

In reply to this petition the first charter was granted Oct. 15, 1751. The next year S. Lane laid out a plan of lots on the Intervale. No settlements were made, however, for several years because of the war still going on with the Indians. The delay in making settlements caused the charter to be forfeited. Note: - Charters were recorded in Portsmouth, N.H. in the official records of charters. These records are now in the state archives in Concord. They were carried away by Gov. Wentworth, but were restored a few years later. While these records were missing the state government ordered a new record made, of the original in possession of the towns.

The Second Charter: -

Just ten years after the granting of the first charter of Holderness, which had been forfeited, the second charter was signed by Gov. Benning Wentworth and Theodore Atkinson; Secy of the colony, on the 24th of Oct. 1761.

The bounds of New Holderness (the name "new" signifying that the charter was granted anew) were as follows: "Beginning at a red oak tree at the foot of the Falls of the Pemigewasset river; thence running East six miles; then turning off again and running westerly six miles to a white Pine Tree marked, standing on the bank of the river aforesaid then running up said river northerly as that runs to the Bound first above mentioned as Bound begun at."

Five conditions were stated in the charter: "First, that every grantee shall cultivate five acres out of every 50, within two years; Second, that all white and other fine trees suitable for making masts for the royal navy, be reserved for that purpose; Third, that a tract of the township be marked out for town lots, each of one acre; fourth, that for four years, the tax on the township shall

be one ear of Indian corn, to be paid on Christmas Day; and fifth, that after that time, every proprietor, settler, or inhabitant shall pay annually on Christmas Day; one Shilling Proclamation money for every hundred acres which he owns, settles, or possesses."

The names of the sixty-one grantees were on the back of the charter. Two of the grantees held one share between them, each of the others, one share.

In addition to the sixty shares, were seven more, one for the Society for Propagating the Gospel in foreign parts; one for the School, one for the first Settled Minister in communion with the Church of England; one for a globe for the Church of England as by law established, and three for His Excellency, the Governor.

The Name: Gov Benning Wentworth named the town in compliment to the Earl of Holderness; who in 1751; just at the time of giving the first charter, became a Secretary of State in the English Government, and was made responsible for the good conduct and welfare of the colonies.

In 1816 the name of the town was changed from New Holderness to Holderness by act of the legislature, after being petitioned by the inhabitants.

Division of Land & Drawing of Lots: In Oct. 1752, Samuel Lane laid out a plan of lots on the Intervale. Each proprietor drew three lots; a 3 acre lot in the upper Intervale north of the great Bend, a 3 acre lot in the lower Intervale south of the Great Bend, and a one-acre lot for a house in the section set apart for the town on the north side of what was then called Down Brook but afterwards called Spring Brook (near Wescott place, Dr. Ash. road.)

In the midst of this section, a square of land containing four acres, was reserved for a church and has ever since been called Church Hill.

Church Hill is one of the ^{hills} ridges between Owl Brook and the Pemigewasset River. Whittier's Hill, Peavey's Hill and Hicks' Hill are some of the hills forming this ridge. Church Hill is northwest of Hicks' Hill and north of Spring Brook.

Lane's map represents an intention rather than an attainment, for nobody settled in the place and the charter was forfeited.

Town Records of Holderness, N.H.

1750 Thomas Shepard, his brother-in-law, Thomas Ellison, and Samuel Lane; all of Durham, visited Holderness. Thomas Shepard presented a petition signed by sixty-four persons to Benning Wentworth, the Royal Governor, for a grant of His Majesty; George the Third's land.

1751 Oct. 15. Governor Wentworth laid the petition before the council who consented to it, and the first charter was granted. This charter was forfeited for lack of settlement; although the grantees had drawn for lots on the intervale, according to a plan laid out by Samuel Lane, 1752; surveyor; who had planned and surveyed the Township (see "Holderness" by Hodges. Chpt. III.)

1756 Date of the earliest map which shows the Holderness region.

1761 Oct. 24. Holderness received its second charter. The names of the sixty-one grantees were on the back of the charter (See "Holderness" by Hodges P. 59)

Proprietor's Meetings (from Miss Pease's notebook)

The first meetings of the proprietors of Holderness were held in the inn of Winborn Adams in Durham from 1762 to about 1768. Later they were held in the inn of John Rayn at Newtown in Dec (West of Durham). The granters of the charter were known as Proprietors. No local town meetings were held in Holderness for ten years after the granting of the charter.

All officers for the town were elected at meetings held by the Proprietors in Durham, where most of them lived.

The Minutes of the meetings of the Proprietors of Holderness, from 1762 to 1826 and the Minutes of the Town Meetings from 1771 to 1815, are contained in two manuscript volumes called the Parwhole Books. They are in the keeping of the Town Clerk.

The allotment of Holderness, under the charter of 1761, was made in three sections. The first land to be divided was the Intewale. This was surveyed and planned by Abraham Batchelder in Oct. 1762. The new plan differed from Dane's division into lots of 3 acres, 2 such to each man.

Batchelder's plan provided for 67 pieces of ground, each of 8 acres. The arrangement of the Town, stood as in the previous map of Dane; the one-acre lots being set about Church Hill.

In the end of Oct. 1762, the proprietors met at Durham, at the Inn of Winborn Adams ^{and} drew for these parcels of Intewale land, which were called 'lots' from that common custom.

Afterwards in 1765, they drew for places in the First Division of hundred-acre lots between Little Squam and the Penni River.

Finally, in 1774, they drew for the hundred-acre lots of the Second Division, around Big Squam Lake, north and south.

Settlement of Holderness (from Miss Pease's notebook)

Only a few of the grantees of the charter given in 1761, actually took up their residence in Holderness.

The first settler in town was William Piper, whose name does not appear in the list of original grantees. Wm. Piper lived in Stratham when he married John Shepard's daughter, Susannah. John Shepard lived near Shepard's Bridge, on the road to Newmarket. He had been a ranger with Robert Prosen, serving as Captain of a company in 1757.

When the War of Independence came, he decided to remain neutral, but was arrested by over-zealous patriots and put on parole at Exeter. On being released, he entered the British service. He was killed in action, on ship board off Grand Menan Island, near Nova Scotia.

His daughter, Susannah, was baptized Jan. 6, 1728/9; history states. On her marriage to Wm. Piper, she had her father's lot in Holderness for dowry. It was lot 31, lying between Squam Lake and White Oak Pond on the west side of the connecting brook.

Here Wm. Piper and his wife Susannah came in 1763 and with the building of their cabin, the actual settlement of Holderness began.

Their son, Nathaniel, was the first white child born in town. Caleb Smythe, born 1763 or 64 was the second. The first birth recorded was that of Samuel Shepard, 4th born Feb. 3, 1768.

By 1771, there were so many settlers that they felt the need of a local administration of their affairs, consequently the following petition for the first town meeting was presented to Samuel Livermore, one of the King's justices.

Also voted Nicholas Gookin, Collector for the

 money.

Also voted that Hercules Mooney be empowered to
 employ a Pilot to find out a good and convenient
 place for a road to be cleared from Canterbury
 to New Holderness, and voted said Pilot to be paid
 said Proprietors also voted that Richard Downing,
 Mr. David Simcox, and Joseph Cox be a committee
 to call the former Selectmen to an account
 what they have done with the money that was
 collected and delivered to them by the collectors

Also voted that there shall be a committee of
 twelve men to clear the road from Canterbury
 to New Holderness, and voted each man four
 pounds, old tenor.

Also voted that Hercules Mooney be empowered

pray a town meeting in said town may be warned and held according to law for the following purposes: Namely first to choose a moderator, secondly to choose all legal town officers, thirdly to see if the town will grant any money for contingent charges of the town; as your petitioners shall pray etc.

An Act to constitute the Town of Ashland from a part of the Territory of the Town of Holderness.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

Sec. 1 That all that part of Holderness lying within the following lines and bounded - to wit:

Beginning at the corner of the towns of New Hampton and Centre Harbor, on the boundary line of the said town of Holderness, thence north two and one-fourth degrees west one mile and twenty one and forty eight one hundredths rods to stone, thence north thirty-two and one fourth degrees, west three miles and two hundred ninety three and twenty one hundredths rods to stone; thence north eighty-two and one fourth degrees west one mile and one hundred sixty eight and eighteen one hundredths rods to the Pemis. River; thence southerly by said Pemis. River to the northerly corner on sd river, of the said town of New Hampton to the point of beginning - be, and the same hereby, is severed from said town and made a body politic and corporate, by the name of Ashland.

Sec. 2 All real and personal properties, including all debts, claims and demands of every kind now owned by and due to the town of Holderness, all school and other funds belonging to said town, and the proportion of the literary funds, which, until a new apportionment of State Taxes shall be payable to said towns, shall be divided between them in the proportion of five dollars and forty nine cents to Ashland and four dollars and fifty one cents to Holderness, and if, said towns cannot agree upon the division of any such property, the County Commissioners for the County of Grafton, for the time being, upon the request of either town, may make division of the same, or assign the same or any thereof, to either of said towns and may order the town to which such property may be assigned to pay, over such sums of money to the other town as in their opinion is

equitable according to the foregoing proportion, and may fix the time of payment.

Sect. 3. All taxes assessed since March last upon the polls and estate of persons residing in said Ashland, as hereby constituted, and all non-resident taxes assessed since March last, in said Town, shall be collected by the collector to whom the same has been committed for that purpose; and after deducting there from the State and County taxes, shall be paid by him paid over to said Town of Ashland, in the same manner in which he is directed to pay the same to the Town of Holderness, before this division thereof, and the treasurer of Ashland, when duly chosen and qualified, shall have the same power to issue an extent against such collector, for any neglect to comply with the provisions of this act, that he would have if such collector had been chosen by said town of Ashland.

Sect. 4. All debts & liabilities heretofore incurred by said town of Holderness, and all municipal expenses, of said town since the first day of March last, shall be paid by the aforesaid towns in the same proportions as herein before prescribed for the division of property.

Sect. 5. All paupers now supported by, and in the actual receipt of assistance from said Holderness, shall be supported by the towns of Holderness and Ashland, each contributing in the same proportion as herein before mentioned for the division of property until such time as either of said towns shall call for a division of said paupers; and if said towns do not agree upon a division, the aforesaid County Commissioners for the time being, shall upon the request of either of said towns, determine and assign to each of them its proportion of said paupers shall be supported by each of said towns.

Sect. 6. In all assessments of State & County taxes, until the Legislature shall otherwise order, Holderness, as constituted after this division, thereof shall pay one dollar and 72 cents and Ashland 2 dollars and nine cents and

the State & County Treasurers shall issue the ¹³⁷ respective warrants accordingly.

Sec. 7. Jonathan F. Keyes, Otis P. Warner, and Edwin F. Bailey, or any two of them, may call the first meeting of said town by posting up a warrant for that purpose as the law directs, at which meeting either of said persons may preside until a moderator be chosen and at such meeting all necessary town officers may be chosen.

Sec. 8 This act shall take effect from and after its passage. Approved July 1st 1868





The Algonquin race held all the territory east of the Mississippi river and north of the lower boundary of Va. & Kentucky, except N. Y. & Pa. which were held by their enemies, the Iroquois.

Within the limits of the present state of N. H., the Algonquins were divided by the Mts. & the rivers into a dozen tribes. There were 6 tribes from south to north along the present line of railway in the center of the state. The Nashua, in the Nashua valley; the Souhegan in the Souhegan valley; the Amoskeag, in and about Manchester; the Pennacook about Concord, the Winnepesaukee around the lake and the Pemigewassetta at Hold. and Ply.

East of these tribes from south to north were seven others. The Squamscot about Exeter; the Piscataquaker about Portsmouth & Dover, the Newishawannocks in the valley of Salmon Falls; the Ossipees about the Great Pond & Mts. of that name. The Pequabets in the valley of the Sacb, the Amarisoggin in the valley of the Androscoggin and the Cossueks, the Coos Intervales.

For a hundred years after the visit to Winnepesaukee by white men & the marking of Endicott Rocks, the middle part of N. H. remained unoccupied by white men.

About 25 yrs. after this expedition, the Indian War began in 1675 which continued at intervals for nearly a century. The Indian Trail lay between the French & Indian town of St. Francis, now Pierreville, on the St. Lawrence River and the English towns of Portsmouth, Dover, Exeter and Hampton.

It came down by land & water along the St. Francis River, across Lake Memphremagog, through the thick forests to the Coos, down this highway to Baker's River, to the Penic, by the Squam Lake, along Winnie to Alton Bay & thence across the country to the coast.

Along this trail, the savages retreated after their attacks on the Coast towns, with their plunder and their captives. These captives were probably the first white persons who passed through Hold. The white men in following the Indian Trail to rescue the captives carried to St. Francis in Canada, became acquainted with the region around Squam Lakes & the Penic River.

162 My note - Father Mc Donough, who was the Catholic Priest there, for several years - about 1920 to 1924 or more, made an intensive study of the Indians of this Area. His notes were lost after his death, according to Mrs. Kieley, his housekeeper. He never sufficient proof to the N.H. Gov. so that they recorded that there was an Indian Burial ground on the Union Bridge flat Intervale - (Coming from Ash, go to Union Bridge Road, take road near Chipping Mill, go across tracks, bear left, look for or oak where the Barn was or is, go to left of bank, go towards wooded area, about 100 yds. Go into wooded area, almost to bank of Penn. River. Try to go in Spring or early Summer. If you search carefully, you can find at least 10 roundish indentations (not deep) and one in center, in big circle (each dent about 20 in. across) Fred Moore showed this to Percy Brown & I about 1950 or '49. Percy Brown brought a expert, later to "dig" (scrape) they were there less than half an hr. and felt it was not an Indian Burial Ground. However, Father Mc D. had dug there with 2 or 3 local men and found bones, scraps of baskets, large heads etc. When Hwy 93 was being built the engineers called me to find out where this was as it was in State Highway Records that it must be preserved. Phil Eastman, Geo. Brown (who lived on Glen Cove Farm nearby) & Frank Harris all had dug there, too and found artifacts. Also supposedly an Indian Mound near present Arthur Cross house (up in back) Many arrows heads & pieces of pottery found near former Toll Bridge.

Union Bridge

The Union Bridge connecting the towns of Ash & Bridgewater after having done service since 1853, is to be replaced by \$1,200,000 steel riveted bridge. It is to be built by the United Constr. Co. of Albany, N.Y. The bridge is to be completed by July 1, calls for an 18 ft. Roadway and will be built on rollers to allow for contraction and expansion. The first bridge to span the Penn. was built in 1820 and during a freshet in the Spring of 1848 was carried down the river. Dr. Samuel Wright who for 50 yrs. practiced medicine in Ash, was the last one to cross the bridge before it washed away. He had been to Bridgewater on a case and men tried to stop him but he had a very sick patient in Ash, and felt he must get across. One report said he was on horseback, another that he had a horse & carriage. He had barely reached the Ash side when the structure went down with a crash. The wooden bridge was built in 1853. It had a plank floor.

Yragton County Gazetteer P. 112 Hist. of Bristol P. 20 & 21

An Indian Village was located about one quarter mile below the section to contain Indian graves and on the river.

A band of Mohawks came on this Summer, Village of Indians and killed many women & children as the Braves were off hunting. Some escaped by canoe across the river to Bridgewater and hid in a cave now known as Indian Cave. The Children were quieted by drugging them with herbs. One Indian girl saw the river, was fired on but dove under water and hid behind a rock in the river but near the shore.

A battle took place when the braves returned and the Mohawks were driven off.

Women and children were buried in one grave and warriors in another (circular).

The Mohawks dead were buried on the Bridge water side.

The Baker River Fight from "Parables About the Weirs" by Edgar H. Wilson.

At the mouth of the Baker's River, in the Town of Ply., N.H., there was an Indian settlement at one time, as indicated by numerous Indian graves, boxes, gun barrels, stone mortars & pestles & other articles found there.

Here the local Indians were defeated in a hot fight by Capt. Baker and a small party, for whom the river is named. Tradition states that a friendly Indian accompanying the party of white men informed them that a big band of Indians were coming from Lake Winnipisaukee and that unless they departed immediately they would likely be destroyed. Thereupon they started down the Penikese Valley, not stopping until they reached the vicinity of Salisbury, below Franklin. Here, entirely exhausted, they encamped for the night, and here the Indian cunning assisted itself. The faithful Indian guide told the white men to each build 2 or more fires and use several sticks each to broil their meat with, or to burn the ends of the sticks as though they had been used for that purpose. The suggestion was adopted and the party got away as quickly as possible.

When the pursuing Indians reached the abandoned camp and counted the no. of fires & the numerous sticks they concluded that the white men were too many for them and abandoned the pursuit.

From the Personal Files of Percy S. Brown, Pres. of N.H. Archaeological Soc. & Indian Lore Expert.

Lieut. Thos. Baker and the Baker River Fight. Hist. of Ply. Vol. 1. P. 6 & 7 Note. It is clear from this record that the then Gov. could only account for 4 Indians killed and only 1 scalp produced.

P. 8. Penhallow's acct. is referred to as asserting that 8 Indians were killed "without the loss of a man."

P. 8 & 9 Note History seems to like to record that our gallant soldiers, usually the leader, shot it out with the leader or Chief of the Indians. The gallant white is grazed by the ball from the Indian's gun. The Indian is struck on the breast and jumps. How he jumps at Baker River the Chief only jumped 4 or 5 ft. before falling "instantly" dead.

Levi Clough had charge of bldg. Epis Church.

A Mr. Gordon lived at Epis. parsonage very early. Living there when Frank was a boy. Had dau. Ruth who m. a Mr. Briggs & moved away.

Mr. Huskins - Leather Board was made out of straws & scraps of leather ground & reduced to pulp in a Beater, then run on a felt and over huge rolls to roll them to desired thickness. Last roll had a deep slit, when right thickness, they took a Brad Awl & cut it into sheets along the slit laid it on boards & put it in a Dry house in Winter. In Summer, laid it in fields on Thomp. St. Carr Ave. Wash. St. & in back of Catholic Church to dry. Then because it often was warped, took it in & steamed it & rolled it flat.

Used for soles of shoes. Straw Board about the same not very satisfactory for soles as peeled off in layers when wet or it curled up.

owned by Albert Smith, Jr.

Winthrop Y. Hanaford, grandson of Peter had farm
where George Huskins now lived. D. ae 92. His son
Rockwood Young succeeded him. Farm purchased over
40 yrs. ago (around 1900) Hanaford Family Cemetery
located on Albert Smith farm.

Beyond Cemetery is "Quietside" - Ralph Huskins -
Settled by Josiah Magoon in 1783. Bought first 30
acres from his father-in-law Stephen Sleeper for 25
pounds & shillings & 9 pence. Sleeper (from Poplin)
now Freeman, once owned 500 acres of land here.

Josiah Magoon a Rev. vet. Had 8 sons & 1 dau. Had
a mill on Magoon Brook.

There were 2 houses between Magoons & Pte 318
Owned by Bennett & Ingalls families.

Another Hanaford house between Albert Smith
& School house

Hanaford School house 2nd bldg. there. The
first was south of Dana Meeting house.

Meeting house built in 1800.

Across from Dana Meeting House is the
Raymond C. Smith's house. First bldgs. were higher
up the hill. Present house built by Capt. Jeremiah
Sanborn.

In early 1800's Capt. Peter Hanaford bought farm
gave half to daughter Nancy Hanaford Magoon & sold
other half to her husband, Stephen S. Magoon. He
was a carpenter & cabinet maker.

Stephen S. Magoon had a woodworking shop
& store. Kept students. Among them Arthur Edw.
St. Log Levermore, sons of Judge Lev.

Squire Magoon sold farm & bought place near
Old Institution. Then Daniel & Calvin Huskins
lived there & had a blacksmith shop. Later
moved to Ash.

Gordon Farm once the Jeremiah Marston farm,
now owned by Edwin Huskins. J. Marston one of
earliest in town. Was a lumberman & agent for English
Crown in Colonial days. Delegated to select tallest &
best of grand white pines for masts for Eng. Fleet. Logs then
hailed by oxen to Penikese, driven down river to the
Merimack to ship yards at Newburyport, Mass.

Early Town Meetings held in his barn. westerly
field known as Parade field. used by militia.

After death of J. M. farm owned by James Gordon
son of Zebulon Gordon who first settled on
Huckleberry Road. Then Benj. Smith Gordon, Curtis
A. Gordon & Louis A. Gordon.

The house was burned in 1923 & farm purch.
by John Marsh. Later sold to Edwin Huskins.

174 Down the lane to west of the Marston place, was a small farm - a Wiggins who lost family in some tragedy, came to spend rest of life here. Next 2 farms belonged to Nathl Drake & Nathl Jr. & Abraham Drake, Abraham Jr. All successful farmers. Later known as Lealie B. Smith farm. John Parker Smith bought it in 1850's then Frank B. Smith, then Lealie B. Smith, John Parker a descendant of "Shaving" John Smith who lived on Beech Hill.

Clem. Beard farm, was Nathl Drake place. Stayed in Drake family until death of Mr. & Mrs. Joseph S. Drake. Then Merrill Beard had it. Drakes were personal friends of Col. Jonathan Moulton, pres. prop. of Town. Gave tract of land to Thomas Drake & Jeremiah Marston.

At top of hill is Dr. Simeon Dana Place - now Mrs. Ziba Smith's. Dr. Dana d. in 1853. Now owned by Smith's. Beyond Dana place, was once a sizable farm of Joseph Young. Later Plasted's. Bldg. gone. Sharp turn to right to Little Hollow down

steep Freeman's hill to Frank E. & Leonard O. Huckins. Was Ruben Magoo's. Next owned by Rufus Prescott, relatives of the Dow & Hager families. Later came Orrin & Samuel Plasted who sold to Edwin M. Huckins.

High hill in back of L. Huckins - Millerites in 1840's thought world was coming to an end. gathered there to await end. Had not planted crops so had to live on neighbor's supplies.

At end of Huckins' road is farm founded by Deacon John Huckins. Now Rehe. Heards. Near crest of hill between L. Huckins' & Beards was Jacob Drake's.

Deacon James Huckins settled on farm owned by Mrs. Sawler. Coming from L. Huckins toward Hanaford School were 2 more farms - Jonathan Dow, son in law of Capt. Peter Hanaford. Then Luther Huckins & lastly John Carliss family.

At foot of hill was Philip Smith's who moved to Center Harbor. Daniel M. Smith lived there then George B. Gordon. Bldg. moved to Henry Benton's in n. part of town and barn added to Geo. Huckins' place. Just a few steps off road between Geo. Gordon's school house is old baptizing pool in brook where baptismal services held.

John Marsh (Moulton's) farm in continuous ownership in same family. Benj. Smith a Rev. soldier came from Hampton in 1777 with 2 bro. & built log cabin behind present house. Benj. lived with Jer. Moulton while building his house.

Samuel P. Smith, son of Benj. lived there next. 1 dau. M. Kendrick Smith & Eliza M. John Parker Smith Kendrick's dau. M. Albert L. Smith - parents of Mrs. Alice Marsh. Once 2 houses there.

On Huckleberry road, only 1 house. But once several farms. Puttages, Websters, Gordons, Shaws & Robinson (Callig)

There are 3 Smith cemeteries within this area - the above 2 and the lovely one near Sharps. Since the village of Ashland was more accessible than New Hampton, the residents petitioned the State to be annexed to Ashland. Failing this, they petitioned to have that area set off as a separate town - Smithville or Smith Town. This failed too.)



great, great grandfather of Charles's Parker Howe.

Parker Howe, Sr. moved into Hold. on Apr. 22, 1808. He lived in one other place for a short time, then built the first ^{house} on Buddin's or Leavitt Hill. The second Howe house is across the road - the Philip E. Stevens' house. According to Mudge Pease who knew the Howes well, & Samuel Smith who later owned the first Howe house, it was moved over the hill past Frank Lambert's, then to Winona, side of Jim Rollins' then in a little road to the left of the Rollins' house.

(Old Eastman's parents, the Smiths had a little house on that road and there was a second small house beyond, nearer the R.R. tracks)

The house was moved in winter, by a oxen, up the narrow, steep road to the Samuel Smith, (Sam's father) place, then part way down the hill to Jackson Pond. The wooden house was placed on a brick foundation where the kitchen was to be.

At first the Smiths owned it, then Mr. & Mrs. James Jackson. Mr. Jackson died and for a while, the widow Jackson lived alone. Then Leon Dorsey's grandfather, Charles Plummer Stevens (who was then in 4th or 8th grade) went to help her for a year or two. He married young and he & his wife lived with Mrs. Jackson for a while.

According to both Leon Dorsey & Sam. Smith Mrs. Jackson later had a John Petty, a salesman living with her. He was a big man with a full beard. He & Mrs. J. had many arguments.

Leon Dorsey told me that Mr. Petty strangled Mrs. J. one night and threw her body over the ledge into Jackson Pond. The next morning, he went down, recovered her body, put it in a wheel barrow and wheeled her back to the house where he put her in a closet.

He set the Bible opened on the table, with her glasses beside it and her Rocking Chair nearby. Soon someone from Smith's called. He told them that Mrs. J. went for a walk and disappeared. A few days later, the neighbors were suspicious and called the police. Petty got away and was never seen again.

At one time there were 7 houses on the F. Lambert road, Lambert's built in 1805, David H. Fogg's (Sam. Holmes place) built even earlier, a Plastered house on old road from Bert Amaden's to Lambert's Hugh Smith house above Lambert's where Praton's new house is, a Drake House and at the top of the hill was James Rowe's (Julia Griffin's maternal grandfather) I did not learn about the 4th house.

According to Madge Pease, Down Historian who knew the Howes well and Samuel Smith who later owned the first Howe house - it was moved over the hill past Prof. Hartley's, down the Frank Lambert rd., across present Winona Rd. to James Rollins, Sr.'s then in a little rd. to left of his house and up the steep hill to the top - overlooking present Jackson Pond. House burned later. Mrs. Jackson lived there.



Notes taken from Dear George Hodges's first 235
manuscript of Book of Holderness.

1. On slip of paper - Capt. John Shepard Jan. 1, 1757 was given pay for 53 men in Col. Nathl. Preservie Regt. for services at Crown Point (H 551) In 1757 Feb. 16, date Portsmouth he added vac. of 1 more soldier to be paid. In March Capt. Shep. is ordered to Long Island. In (This no doubt the Capt. Shepard who was taken prisoner)

Samuel Curry, near the end of the list was a person of vagrant and eccentric habits, who had no settled habitation but found frequent solace at Judge Liversmore's. There was always an iron bread basket heaped with corn and rye bread and a potters ware pitcher of cider on the kitchen table for all comers.

The Liversmore boys gave him an unflinching welcome, for he taught them to make carts & sleds & shingle toys. He was called "the carpenter."

From Rawhide Book from A. Liversmore's notes

They are summoned to vote for "a President" and a Senator. Roads are mentioned by name - from Capt. Andrew Smyllie to Squam Bridge, Province & College Roads. From Hon. Saml Liversmore to Campston Lane.


Voted to clear Ministerial Interwale.

1785 - It appears of the votes that 16 persons were at the town meeting. All voted for Hon. Saml Liversmore for President. Voted to pay nothing to the constables who have served in times past

Samuel Shepard kept the tavern. There were posted notices of town-meetings, of elections, of new laws and ordinances of administration. Bills of sales of auctions, records of transfers were naturally posted therein. The taverns were the original business exchange. No wonder all the men in the township flocked to the tavern - they had to know anything of town affairs.

Distances were given in almanacs of the day not from town to town but from tavern to tavern. John Adams, in 1771, said of one landlord, "he is as happy, as big, as proud, as conceited as any nobleman in England."

The charges were 10¢ for night's lodging, 12½¢ for a cold bite, 25¢ for a regular meal.



Canon Lewis P.W. Balch of Montreal retired to Hold (1766) and for 2 or 3 yrs. carried on service in the little church, with the rows of carriages surrounding the bldg., the church jammed. He bought 400 acres, part of the Liv. estate

C.C. Shepard said Miller John Shepard being selectman took A.L.'s land as high that A. Liv. said he had to sell it to anybody who put that price. The Miller pd it & a day moved over the river to the house he bought of Squidlyth which is still called the Liv. House (old Aly. Hospital)

Carleton C. Shepard writes -

In 1751 John Shepard was offered the charter of Hold Jolia Shepard was b. 1682, one of the 7 children of Samuel & Mary Shepard of Haverhill, Mass & later of Salisbury; perhaps b. at Salisbury.

Judge div. did as he chose. At Exeter, his court was surrounded by a mob about to overrun Jew. Court to get them to honor Paper money. He went right on with his business and even forbade anyone to look out of the windows.

1809 Saml Curly & S. Shepard for Hold. & Hugh Kelsea Benj. Moulton for Cr. Harbor. preambulated the line. They found the SE corner of a large pine tree stumpy in health marked 1783 SS & AD is marked 1801 HK & SC.

In 1809 the pine had become a stump so -

P. 4 The date of the grant of Hold. is almost the middle point of N.H. History. Hold. stands on the map in the middle - midway between Canada & Mass, and between Maine & N.H.

P. 25 - Rev. Arthur Brown's dau. Jane (b. 1734) m. Sam^r Livermore Sept. 23, 1759 - Rev. Brown officiated.

His dau. Elizabeth (b. 1746) m. Robert Rogers the Ranger.

His dau. Anne b. (1738) m. Capt. Geo. St. Loe.

Little John of Robin Hood & his Merry Men tells the sheriff "In Holderness, sir, I was borne, I ngs all of my dame, Men call me Reynolde Grenel when I am at home."

3 kinds of lots for each Proprietor - a 1 acre Town lot, an 8 acre Intervale lot & a 100 acre upland lot.

"The graveyard on Church Hill was in the pasture of Mr. John R. Stevens, in the low plain where the Province Rd. & the College road, was to be the Town."

In 1782 occurs this sentence "which brings the Province Rd. so called at the bridge at the Spring Brook."

Gov. Wentworth's great house on east side of Lake Wentworth, 140' x 40' had a gambrel roof. The front door key weighed 1 1/2 lbs. The house had an East India room, the paper painted with oriental scenes. And a King & Queen Room, having on either side a statue of the King & Queen of Eng. John Wentworth entered Harvard at 14.

Re - H. Mooney's grave - The ground about it with a right of way from the road is public property being so provided in the deed.

Priest Fowle 1814 said in a letter most of Hold. Whiskey was distilled from potatoes.

Samuel Shepard was a Tory. There is Tradition that he once refused a drink of water to 2 thirsty soldiers of the Rev. Arthur Livermore in a letter to Carlton C. Shepard says he was called "His Majesty's man" because to his last day he affixed his allegiance to Geo. III.

His wedding coat was lt. blue with buff facing, a cut-away in form. His waist coat was red plush. The walls of his parlor were covered with caricatures of Napoleon and other prints intending to ridicule the men in politics at variance with his own beliefs. His trade was a blacksmith.

In 1785, there were 16 men at Town Meeting
voted to nominate Saml Liv. for Gov. of N.H.

S. Liv. - "On his kitchen table there was always
a great iron basket full of corn & rye bread and
a huge pitcher of cider, free to all who passed by.
Many thirsty way farers journeying to & from the
Ply. ferry stopped at this open door & blessed the
host.

An aged woman named Shepard (Louisa) died at
the County farm and at her request was buried
beside her ancestors. A road had to be cut out with
axes to gain admittance to the place.

1846 Bishop Chase reports Trinity Church in state
of afflictive desolation and whether it can be raised
without a miracle to any considerable degree of
vigor, is doubtful. It is several years since the Rev.
Fowle, now at an advanced age, has been able to
officiate. In 1848 he notes the death of Rev. Fowle
after many years of weakness, infirmity and
separative from active duties of ministry. The greater
part of the church property has been lost through
neglect & injudicious management. In 1848, a congrg
of 25 or 30. He notes "under the ministry of Rev.
R. Fowle a large amt of Church property, consisting
chiefly of Glebe lands was either sold or placed under
lien. Somebody has stolen the large Bible.

Wm. Piper's land near + Saw Mill between Big Squa.
& White Oak Pond on College rd (where Frank Piper lived)
Garrison house a little further along on same rd where
Ira Jones' house now stands.

Jimmie lived at Bruce Piper's "Jimmie field." Saml
Gaines supposedly lived near old Pound (near
Nat Childer house)

Arthur Liv. remembers the floor of Trin. Church
was full of knot holes & creaked under feet of congreg.
He said it warmed his heart to remember the church
as it was 75 yrs. ago. The Shepards, John, Col. Jo.
"Honesty Bill" Robert & their sisters were in the
first pew. Next came Capt. James Cox, the Ellisons,
then Capt. Robert Cox, his sister Esther called
"Aunt Esther" in her gown of changeable silks. She
walked so slowly she moved hardly at all. The
Waldo of Ply. & Ramsey came in a carriage.

Capt. John Shepards' bro. Capt. Jo. buried

or sister Susannah who m. Wm. Piper.

240 A letter of Rev. R. Fowler dated 1814, says "The church in the western part of the town was erected in the yr. 1797. The other in the eastern part was erected 1803 and is only finished outside."

A letter of Arthur Davis 1897 in possession of Mrs. Shepard says "I once had the original subscription paper signed by various persons and denoting their respective contributions to the bldg. of the church. They were generally small and for specific articles and in the aggregate quite insufficient for the object - the effect upon my mind was to remit to me the tradition that, the Livermores among them substantially built the church and allocated the pews. The land on which the church was built was never conveyed to Trinity Church. It remained in the ownership of the Livermores."

Trinity was called the North Church & the Square Bridge Church, the East Church. The East Church was in one corner of the Square Bridge Cemetery.

A. Liv. says "Squire Livermore's accounts for 1775 and onward make frequent mention of Pease among the farm products. Pease porridge & bean porridge entered largely into the diet of each family. Pease Porridge frozen was the usual provision for the traveler."

Dr. Robbins who was the first physician in our records was paid \$20 for attending Robert Cox. The Selectmen were directed to take all of Cox's band "for security to them and him on a future day."

One acct. in Farmer & Moore's Collection P. 3, says that Thomas Baker & the Sachem Watternomias had a duel. Baker was grazed in left eyebrow. Watternomias shot fatally & leaped 4 or 5 ft., falling dead.

Baker carried off a lot of bear skins.
Another acct. by Mrs. Bean, dau. of Baker, says Baker fought a large body of French & Indians coming down from Canada. Baker & his men fired from ambush, killing so many that the others retreated. She says that Baker took Watternomias' horn & other trinkets and that they are still among his descendants.

Holderness, N.H. was named for the Earl of Holderness, who was one of his Majesty's Council at the time of the formation of the Plymouth Company.

The grant of the town was made to my great grandfather John Shepard, Sr. and Gov. Benning Wentworth Nov. 18, 1751 by King George the Third and entered and recorded by Thomas Atkinson, Secretary. The following names appear in the original petition for the grant of Holderness.

"The old Shepard house, where town meetings were held" when we were under the King. was the property of a man who until his death continued to be under the King.

The owner, Samuel Shepard appeared every Sunday in his red uniform, sword at his side and walked up & down the aisles of the church keeping order.

An officer who had fought under the old flag, Captain Shepard like many another man of that period, was overcome with sorrow at the separation of the Colonies from the Mother Country. He refused to become a citizen of the new Republic. He remained until death a citizen of Britain.

Son of Lt. Gov. John Wentworth, b. at Portsmouth, N. H. July 24, 1696 and d. there Oct. 14, 1770.

He grad. at Harvard College, Class of 1715 and was Gov. of N. H. from 1741-1766. A well known merchant and frequently a Representative to the Assembly. He was appointed a Councillor Oct. 12, 1734.

In 1749, he began to make grants of land west of the Conn. River in what is now Southern Vt. which led to a collision with N. Y. as a Claimant of this Domain - The so-called region of the "N. H. Grants"; Bennington, Vt. was named after him. He declined to give a charter to a college in N. H. unless it was put under direction of the Bishop in London.

But later he gave a lot of 500 acres of land to Dartmouth College on which its bldgs. were erected.

He cooperated with the Assembly in giving money towards the repairs of the Harvard College Library, after it was destroyed by fire.

College Road

Ref. Hist. of Carroll County by Georgia Drew Merrill

Through the influence of Gov. Wentworth, the Assembly passed a bill continuing the road from the Gov's house in Wolfeborough to Ply. This was laid out in 1771, the Committee for that purpose making return under date of Sept. 20, 1771. They say -

which road is marked for 3 rods wide, beg. at the Gov's house in Wolfeborough, aforesaid, running from thence north 27° east, 1 mile and 1/4 to Mr. Ridges - from thence west 45° north, 3/4 mile on Wolfeborough road - from thence west 40° north, 7 miles to Miles Road, so called - from thence west 45° north 1/4 mile to Squire Linn's; from thence N. 40° W. 5 miles on Miles road to Melvin River - from thence north 32° west 3 miles + 1/2 on said road to Col. Moulton's - from thence north 34° W. 1 mile to Ebenezer Blake's - from thence W 20° south, 6 miles + 1/4 to Senter's - from thence west 40° N. 8 miles + 1/2 to Shepard's - from thence N 20° W 1 mile + 1/2 to Squire Livermores - from thence N. 25° West, 2 miles and 1/4 to Penix river at entrance of Mill Brook.

The whole of which being computed to be 36 miles + 3/4.

This road cont. to Dart. College in Hanover and same yr. laid out, Gov. & Lady passed over route in their Coach. It was the first four-wheeled carriage ever seen in that section. It was a coach & six with mounted guards & levery.

Squam Lake

Hist. of Carroll County P. 113

"The most beautiful lake in New Eng." It's origin in the Algonquin language was "Wonne-as-squam-aubae", the beautiful - surrounded by water place, "according to Judge C. E. Potter, "Kee-ee-trunk-nip-ee" the "goose lake of the highlands; contracted into "Kusump" by the English. Capt. John Govevell, in his journal under date Feb. 10, 1724, says "We traveled 16 miles & camped at the north side of Kusump pond." Capt. Samuel Willard says "1775, Sat. Sept. 25 - followed ye Indians, and a little before we came to Kusump pond, we found where they broke one canoe - coming to ye pond could follow them no further. Jeffrey's map, 1750 says "Kusump".

Blanchard's map, 1761 & Holland's map 1784 "Kusump Pond" - the latter adds, however "Squam Lake", Bellinger's map, 1791 & Carrigan's map 1816 call it "Squam". Farmer & Moore's N.H. Gazetteer 1823 calls it Sullivan or Squam Lake

Schools

In 1775 efforts were made to have a Public School but were unsuccessful. Judge Livermore engaged Priest Fowle as a tutor for his children in his own home. A few of the neighbor's children soon were invited to attend.

Shortly before 1800, Judge Livermore had built a small one room schoolhouse opposite Trinity cemetery. Priest Fowle continued to teach there for awhile. This bldg. was later used to house wandering sheep. It was purchased and removed to the Mudgett home, where it became part of the present Mrs. Lichigarn's summer home.

A framed article hangs on the wall in her home: Jesse Mudgett Bot of Wm. W. Russell 1835 Nov. 4th 1 old School House at above The Foundation Wm. W. Russell for Russell & Merrill

On the back was this inscription "Our old shop which stood opposite the cemetery (Trinity) which had been a shelter for wandering sheep."

According to Town Records the Town of Hold. had been divided into 8 Districts in 1810. I believe the School districts to be the same.

- First District - Mt. Prospect Rd.
- Second " Trinity Church Area
- Third " Yardback Corner District
- Fourth " Owl Brook & Place districts
- Fifth " present village of Oak.
- Sixth " Burleigh Farm Area on Sand. Rd.

In 1808, it was voted to accept lot # 32 in the first division of 100 acre lots for the first division school lot. An agent was appointed to receive the deed of the same. Joshua Smyth was appointed agent. Aldermiss Village (now Ark.) wished to have a school. The petition (original) is now in possession of Alma Avery.

1824 Aug. "We the undersigners being desirous to have a private school kept at the school house in Dist. No. 5; wishing to employ Betsey Howard as an instructress, agree to pay her our equal proportion of 1 per week according to the no. of scholars, we subscribe for to teach said school which is to commence the first Mon. in Sept. next and continue 2 months also to board her our equal proportion according to the number of scholars. Moses Cheney 4 scholars Joseph Baker 1 " S. M. Morse 1 " George K. Drew 1 "

Hold. Aug. 21, 1824
 Joseph Baker deeded the land for the school. At that time, the road went in front of the school, on the hill. The school had a fireplace. School Mary Baker was kept here for a few years. Later Mitchell Landroche is carpenter made it into a house for Jim Brogan. Later Albert Smith lived there. It is presently owned by Mrs. Thomas Bilodeau. About 1840 a 2 room school house (white) was built on site of present Kenneth Forbes house. The first 4 grades were in 1 room and the upper 4 grades in the

Elm School (Mt. Prospect Rd. Now home of Mrs. — 251
One of the first schools in Holderness, built
during Squire Livermore's time (Feb. 1803). He did not
approve of it but the people proceeded to build it. They
used bricks — possibly from the Curry Brickyard near
present Little Holland Cabins at Little Squam Lake. The
cost of the school was great and people feared they
would never again have Squire Livermore's approval.
Finally a farmer went to Squire Livermore, told him
all about the new bldg and suggested that all they
needed was a teacher.
"Now we need a good teacher like your son, but, of
course he would never consider it," were the farmer's
shrewd words to Livermore.
He said, "Well, ahem, I don't know, I don't know." So
George Livermore became the first teacher of Elm School.

Excerpt from a paper written by Samuel H. Baker, father of
Avis & Gladys Baker: "There were two school-houses. One
was the brick building now occupied by A. Balaban

The Livermore Family of America

by Walter Elliot Shering

Many of the names & descent have a national reputation among them being Hon. Samuel Livermore, a repres. in the first Continental Congress, and Repres. & Senator in the first Congress of the U.S. who was also a leader of the N.A. Bar; in whose footsteps followed his 2 sons, Edward & Loe and Arthur.

1. John Livermore, the ancestor of nearly all the Livermores in the U.S., embarked at Ipswich, Eng. for New Eng., the last of April 1634 then aged 28 yrs., in the "Francis"; John Cutting, master, a large portion of the passengers settling in Watertown, Mass. In the list of passengers, his name was spelt Jolen Livermore.

He had previously m. in Eng. Grace Sherman, dau. of Edmund Sherman & Grace Makin who had lived in Dedham & Colchester County, Essex. Her father came to New Eng. in 1634 & d. in New Haven, Ct. about 1644. He was admitted freeman May 6, 1635, on the list his name is written Leathermore (on a list of very early prop. of Watertown) was a selectman in Watertown in 1665 to 70, d. Apr. 14, 1684 in Watertown ae 78. 10 Children.

2. Sixth Child, Samuel b. May 11, 1640 in New Haven, d. Dec. 5, 1690 in Watertown. He m. June 4, 1668 in Watertown Anna Bridge, dau. of Matthew & Anna Danforth Bridges of Cambridge. He was by trade a maltster in Watertown & had a grist mill; freeman 1671, was a surveyor & selectman 1684 & 1690. 12 Children.

3. Jonathan Livermore (Samuel 2 John 1) b. Apr. 19, 1678 in Watertown, d. there Nov. 8, 1705. He m. Nov. 23, 1699 in Watertown, Rebecca Barno; she d. there a widow Dec. 9, 1765 ae 85 yrs. He was a tanner in Watertown. He had 4 children.

4. Samuel (Jon. 3 Sam'l 2 John 1) b. Mar. 14, 1702 in Watertown d. Aug. 7, 1773 in Waltham. He m. (1) Nov. 10, 1726 in "Hannah, dau. of Wm. & Hannah (Pleased) Brown b. Jan. 22, 1707 d. Nov. 2, 1762. She was the mother of all his children. He subsequently m. 3 wives. He had 9 children, 3 sons graduated at Nassau Hall, Princeton.

5. Samuel (Sam'l 4 Jon. 3 Sam'l 2 John 1) b. May 15, 1732 in Waltham, d. May 18, 1803 in New Hold, N.H. He m. Sept. 22, 1759 in Portsmouth, N.H., Jane, dau. of Rev. Arthur & Mary (Cox) Browne b. 1734 in Providence, R.I. d. Feb. 2, 1802 in New Hold. ae 67 yrs. In Mar. 1748, kept the school in Waltham, In 1750-1, taught school in Chelsea. He sailed from Boston, Sept. 10, 1751 on sloop, "Lydia", Capt. J. Van Wagener, Master, bound to N.Y. on his way to college in Princeton, N.J.

There is an extract from his diary, written on the eve of his journey to college, pub. in Putnam's Mag. for June 1857, for this voyage, he laid in, according to this diary, 5 qts. of West India Rum £1.77.6, 1/4 lb of tea at 48 s., 12 s., Cannister 6 s., 1 doz. fowls £2.10, 2 lbs. loaf sugar, 1 doz. & 8 lemons, £1.9; 3 lbs. butter 12 s., box 5 s.

His stock of clothes might well suit a Collegian of the present day, it consisted of 2 Close coats, 1 great coat 2 jackets, 13 shirts, 7 prs. stockings, 6 caps, 4 cravats, 3 handkerchiefs, 1 pr. breeches.

His books were: Bible, Latin & Greek Testaments + 277
Grammar, Latin Dictionary & Lexicon, Ward's Introd. To Math
Gordon's Geography, Virgil & Tully.

The vessel stopped at Newport, R.I. where he bought a penknife,
a cockcrew & a buckle brush.

He carried letters of introduction to Gov. Belcher & Pres. Burr, which
gave him the highest character for sobriety & studiousness. He arrived
in N.Y. Sept. 27, 1751 & paid the Capt. & 18s in full for his passage.

He began the study of law Hon. Edward Trowbridge & was
admitted to practice at the Supreme Judicial Court of Middlesex
County, Mass. in June 1756. Beginning practice in Waltham, he
removed to Portsmouth, N.H. in 1757, soon became a distinguished
member of the bar. He removed to Londonderry in N.H. in 1764 which
town he represents in Legislature in 1768. He was for several yrs.
Judge Advocate of Admiralty Court, one of the most honorable
lucrative offices in the Province. In 1769 he was commissioned
as King's Atty. General for N.H. by Gov. Wentworth. He was
then residing north of Market Square in Portsmouth.

In 1765, began the settlement of Town of New Hold., He was
one of the original grantees & eventually became, by purchase
the actual proprietor of about 1/2 of the township, owning
some 10 or 12 thousand acres. in Hold., Camp on & Ply. His farms
was upon bank of Peniv. opposite Ply. He erected a flouring mill
& for 2 yrs. or more about 1775-6 attended the mill with his
own hands.

He was for six years a Repres. in State Leg. from Town
of New Hold., after the assumption of Gov. by the people. Before
the Rev. he had been appnt. Atty. Gen. as successor to Hon.
Wyseman Clagett & on Feb. 19, 1776 he was again chosen by
Leg. to same office as successor to the same gentleman.

In Dec. 23, 1776, his appnt. was renewed "for the year ensuing."
It was at this period that a dispute arose in relation to the
jurisdiction of the (so called) N.H. Grants, the territory which
now constitutes the State of Vt. This territory was claimed by
3 States - N.Y., N.H. & Mass., while the inhabitants, acknowledging
no authority but their own will, declared it a free & indep.
State and exercised all the prerogatives of Gov. It was then
proposed by Congress & assented to by the parties that the
whole affair should be heard & decided by Congress.

Accordingly the Leg. of N.H. appnt. S. Liv. on Nov. 4, 1779
Commissioner to support, in conjunction with the delegates
in Congress, the claim of N.H. to the territory in dispute.

He took his seat in Continental Congress Feb. 7, 1780 &
remained in that body about 2 yrs.

In 1782 was appnt. Chief Justice, of State of N.H.

In 1788 a Convention was called in N.H. to consider
the proposed Constitution, submitted to the people by the
great & memorable Convention at Philadelphia. The proposed
former head of Gov. had already been assented to by 8
States and one more was sufficient to ensure its
adoption. Chief Justice dis. made the decision which settled
the fate of the proposed measure and gave us that well
balanced system of Gov. under which we live.

He was chosen a member of the First Congress, taking
his seat in the House of Repres. May 1, 1789 in N.Y. &
accordingly resigned as Chief Justice. He also took his
seat at sessions of the House Jan. 4, 1790 & N.Y. & Dec. 6, 1790,
Oct. 24, 1791 & Nov. 8, 1792 in Pa.

He made his journeys to and from Congress with his
own horse & carriage. Major Wm. Shepard of Hold., his servant,
driving him & his family on such occasions.

In 1791 he was chosen Pres. of the Convention to revise
the State Constit. of N.H. He rec'd the honorary degree of
L.L.D. from Dartmouth in 1792.

In 1793, was elected Senator of U.S. for a full term of
6 yrs. & in 1799, was reelected.

He resigned his seat in Senate June 12, 1801, owing
to impaired condition of his health. He d. May 18, 1803.

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The Livermore farm (on site of present Wald. School for Boys) was inherited by Edw. St. Loe de' who sold it to Arthur soon after 1803. It contained 1000 acres of fields & forest, of intervals & undulations.

I Samuel Shepard (the Hold. Town Clerk.) and Sobriety Hill both of Durham, N.H. were m. Dec. 22, 1767. They resided in Holderness. He was one of the grantees of the charter given Oct. 24, 1761. Sobriety Hill was b. Jan. 20, 1743, the dau. of Wm. & Patience Drew Hill. Sam'l Shepard d. Sept. 27, 1820 in his 81st yr. Sobriety, his wife d. June 12, 1840. Both are buried at Squam Bridge Cemetery.

The Old Shepard Tavern (by Madge Plase) 281

The old Shepard Tavern was built by Samuel Shepard who was one of the grantees of the Hold. charter given in 1761. He was among the early settlers who came to the north part of the town. He was in Hold. in 1768 as the birth of his first child is the earliest recorded birth in the town. (Feb. 3, 1768)

The roads of those early days were only bridle paths. There was not a carriage in the town until 1810, and then only one. The College Road from Wolfeboro to Hanover was laid out from the summer home of Gov. Wentworth in Wolfeboro, through Center Harbor, along the shores of Squam Lakes, past the old tavern, over Hick's Hill to Plymouth, to enable the Governor Benning Wentworth, to attend the first Commencement at Hanover. It was passable for horsemen in 1772.

Several years after this, Samuel Shepard built his Tavern on the College Road in 1783. His youngest child was born in this house soon after her father moved in. The house was not yet completed. This child, Susannah was b. Nov. 13, 1785 and lived to be 102 yrs. old.

She spent her last days with her dau. in Ash. Village. She used to relate to her neighbors how she could remember when there were only 3 houses in what is now Ash. Village.

Samuel Shepard was Town Clerk over 40 yrs. He d. Sept. 27, 1820. His son William lived where the old cellar hole is on the same farm (just above the Tavern). Samuel Shepard's grandson, Thomas Shepard, owned the farm until his death July 18, 1857. It then became the property of Samuel Cook Shepard who was only 7 yrs. old at the time of his father's death. On becoming of age, Samuel Cook Shepard sold the place to S. W. + A. Fletcher in 1871.

The Hold. Town meetings were held at the home of Samuel Shepard from 1786 to 1820, the year of his death. He had surveyed the roads, was a Church official as well as a Town Official.

His fine penmanship may be seen in the Rawhide bound book of first Town Records.

There was no road leading from the Shepard Tavern over the hill to Ash. until 1810. The bridge at the foot of Squam Lake was built that same year.

In 1773, was resolved by vote of town "To build a church 36 ft. in length, 30 ft. in breadth with a 10 ft. port." Town fixed upon a site & voted to raise 30 pounds for its creation.

The next year the town reconsidered this approp. and voted instead that "Each inhabitant shall pay his equal share in labour, boards, shingles & clapboards, run & other things that shall be needed." The amt of run required for work of raising a meeting house was stated as ten gallons.

Nothing came of this vote and not until 1797 was the church erected. For erection, town voted to raise 75 pounds in boards at 24 shillings a thousand.

The first pastor was Robert Fowle of Newburyport, Mass. Was pastor 58 yrs.

The Church has square backed box pews & sounding board.

In Summer & Fall of 1859, Olive Branch Lodge of Ply., originally, when these charter members with exception of A. B. Thompson, who had taken degrees at Concord, took degrees at that lodge. These 7 charter members joined in a petition to grand lodge for letters of dispensation and a constitution empowering them org. a lodge at Hold. (now Ash). Prayer of petition granted & new lodge was org. under name of W. Prospect Lodge. The date of this dispens. was Nov. 7, 1859 with Moses Paul, Grand Sec., Aaron P. Hughes, Grand Master.

First meeting was held Nov. 12, 1859. First Master was A. B. Thompson, 2nd Thomas P. Cheney, 3rd Orlando W. Keyes.

In 1860, Grand lodge at its meeting in Concord, granted a charter under which lodge has since operated. The Institution of lodge was in July 1860, by Grand lodge of N. H. with Aaron P. Hughes as Gavel Master. The first 3 masters of lodge, soon after being installed, enlisted & went into army. Capt. Keyes killed in Battle of Chancellorsville, May 3, 1863. Major Thompson served in 2nd reg. and afterwards promoted to reg. army to a captaincy; was Sec. of State many yrs., d. at Concord 1892.

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Luciano house (Almon Huskins) built 1783, Steven house near Sky Pond Road and Leon's house all built the same.

Benj. Mudgett, an early settler had 2 sons - James at Steven's house and Levi at Leon's. Each given same amt of land. Brook was boundary line between them. Benj. supposed to live at Luciano's. Later Almon Huskins lived there. A Huskins cemetery in back of the house.

Charlie Flander's grandmother was a Mudgett.

Fifield's and Chadwell's lived at the Joe Forbes (Prevoost) place very early. Cemetery in field near Brook.

Plainted Brick yard was just over the wall near Plainted School. Also made bricks across from Al. Guyotte's near brook. Leon when 4 or 5, saw Dan Plainted and Percy York stacking bricks. Both were barefooted.

Victor Huskins' mother lived beyond School House. Used to drive open back and forth in sort of a pit to mix clay, straw and "green stuff" to be made later into bricks. She was barefoot. Her name was Susan.

Plainted's lived at Red Young's and had another house not far away. Barn was across the road.

Steven's place called "Valley View."

Sam Dow -

Obadiah Smith lived near present Paul Bilodeau house. Hackett's lived there or nearby. His store and a blacksmith shop was in field across road from L. Schofield. Obadiah's house burned shortly before Whipple House was finished. Obadiah's father may have lived at Treasure Valley.

Hackett Smith and other Smith lived on road past Plainted School. Leavitt Smith lived at Dixon house. All were related. Gardner, Smith's family may have been related. They lived on hill beyond Jackson Pond.

The American flag with its thirteen stars, symbolic of the thirteen Colonies were adopted by the Continental Congress in June 1777. The new flag was first carried in battle by Stark at Bennington, Aug. 16, 1777.

The sentiment he sent to the Bennington Committee to use at the anniversary celebration. "Live free or die" contains thirteen letters which also is symbolia of the 13 Colonies.

New Regulation of the Militia P. 73

In the Sept. following the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776, an Act was passed by the Gov. of N. H. which radically changed the militia system of the State. It divided the soldiers of the State into 2 classes, a "Training Band," and an "Alarm List."

The Training Band included all able bodied male citizens from 16 to 50 yrs, except a few specified persons or classes. Each officer & soldier was to be constantly provided with a good fire arm, good ram rod, worm, priming wire & brush & a bayonet fitted to his gun, a scabbard & belt therefor, a cutting sword or tomahawk or hatchet, a pouch that will contain a cartridge-box that will hold 15 rounds of cartridges at least, a hundred buck-shot, a jack knife and tool for wedging & flints, 1 pound of powder, 40 leaden balls fitted to his gun, a knapsack & blanket, a canteen or wooden bottle sufficient to hold 1 qt. The town was to provide for those who could not provide for themselves. Each Co. was to muster 8 times a yr.

The alarm list included all males not included in the Training Band, between 16 & 65 yrs. of age and stringent regulations were enacted for the gov. of both classes.
