

## Little Squam Lodges

Little Squam Lodges was an outgrowth of the Leyden Tutoring School in Hanover, NH. The summer school of six weeks run by John Leyden of Philadelphia for about fifty prep school boys rented rooming houses and had a common dining area. Classes were held in a Dartmouth College fraternity house. My father, Dr. Albert Farnsworth, taught at the school from 1914-1927. Due to disciplinary problems during the "Roaring Twenties", four of the teachers and my father bought an established camp of 110 acres from Dr. John May on Little Squam Lake in Holderness, NH. There was no road into the camp. Access was by boat only from property owned on the Route 3 side of the lake. This made for better supervision of students. There was no electricity, only Coleman lamps. My father was director of the camp until 1947.



The tutoring camp ran six weeks from August 1 through September 15. A recreational camp was run for a short time in July. At the peak there were forty to fifty boys enrolled mainly from Worcester Academy and Williston Academy.

The depression and World War II took its toll and finally the men decided to close the school. A group of New York teachers bought the camp in 1947 and made it into a strictly recreational camp called Camp Squamasee.

Cloyd Small and my father retained the ice house on the highway side of the lake and made it into a very rough cabin so they could come and stay at the lake.

My father died in March of 1956 and left his share of the property to his three children - Albert, Barbara, and Nancy. Barbara and her husband, Bob Sheldon, continued to make improvements - a ceiling, windows, porch, etc. During this time they shared the cottage with Mr. Small.

These aims Little Squam seeks to attain in surroundings which promote health and happiness during the summer months.

Where is your school located? Little Squam Lodges is situated on the southeast shore of Little Squam Lake, in the township of Holderness, N. H. Framed by

wooded hills which rise to Mr. Chocorua nearby, this lake affords a superb camp site. Access to camp property, a hundred acres in extent with a half-mile lake frontage, is by motor boat from Holderness bridge. No automobile road penetrates its seclusion; yet it is conveniently near to supplies and excellent medical service. Parents who bring their boys to Little Squam often remark, "I'd like to stay here all summer myself!"

My husband, Bob Sheldon, died in 1972, at which time, I bought out Mr. Small and in 1976 I bought out my brother, Albert, and my sister, Nancy. I put on a two bedroom and bathroom addition and renovated the ice house portion of the structure by improving the kitchen, dining area, and living area thus making an attractive and livable summer cottage!

In 1954 my brother, Albert, built a cottage across the lake for himself, his wife, Betty, and their daughter, Nancy.

The Farnsworth family has, as of 2013, been on the lake for 85 years!

## In Memoriam

Two Holderness natives and supporters of the Holderness Historical Society died this past winter.

Louis Francesco, 93, was a unique town historian who was born and lived here most of his life. Louie loved to share the experiences of his early days in Holderness, activities he was involved in and knew about and recollections of town characters. He operated the bowling alley (now Walter's Basin) from 1959 until the 1980's. Louie loved "steaming" on Squam in the "Halcyon", the steamboat that he restored after retiring. He was always very willing to take anyone for a tour. In the "Halcyon" he led the Holderness 250<sup>th</sup> boat parade. He was a friendly man, a joy to chat with, and always had a smile and upbeat attitude.

Milton Huckins, 94, owned Pemvale Farm, which with its yellow house and big red barns is a landmark on Rte 175 between Holderness and Plymouth. The farm has been in his family more than 100 years and was a dairy farm until the 1960's and then a haying operation.

## National Register of Historic Places

Holderness has the following buildings listed on the National Register: Trinity Church, the Holderness Inn (adjoining Kirkwood Garden), the Library, the Historical Society (formerly the North Holderness Baptist Church) and the Webster Estate.

Now, the National Register has recognized the Squam Lakes Watershed as a unique area and umbrella for several additional structures: Burleigh Brae and Webster Boathouse, Camp Carnes and True Farm. Under the aegis of the Squam Lakes Conservation Society, a committee with representatives from the five towns around the lakes headed by Betsy Whitmore worked to link conservation of ecological resources with conservation of cultural assets and preservation of historic places. Connie Ross represented the Holderness Historical Society on the project. Elizabeth D. Hengen served as preservation consultant and researched the project for two years. The application cover form she prepared is an 81 page overview of local history. Squam: the Evolution and Preservation of a Lakeside Community can be read at the Library or Historical Society and is available for \$25 at the SLCS office. More information about the project including a map of the watershed is available on the SLCS website under "Conservation."




